Message from the Principal

2020 is a year that will be forever etched in the memories of us all and it will provide incredible content for the stories of the future. Compared to the experiences of older generations who experienced world turmoil in the guise of large-scale wars, our students' experiences of the present world turmoil are very different. For many, the opportunity to be

at home with family, parents, and whānau with more time to share, the revival of jigsaw puzzles and board games, is going to be treasured for many years. For others, who experienced sadness and grief during the lockdown, their stories will be very different. What is certain is that the pandemic has affected us all, now and into the future, through disruption.

'Disruption' is a word that has been increasingly used in the past few years to trigger new thinking about how the world of work and learning could look different. We often talk about the disruption caused by the tech industry, for example. In this context of looking forward, the meaning of 'disruption' is used to examine what we currently do and how it could look different to prepare ourselves for a complex, different, and yet unknown world. This year's experiences have fast-forwarded scenarios that people in the past few years have been able to consider with the luxury of time. In a similar way, our annual plan at Kavanagh this year was to review our curriculum delivery and develop a stronger knowledge and application of digital learning. Fast forward to May, and the pathway ahead of us is much clearer.

We are very aware that, for students to move into a world of work where the landscape is changing rapidly, the skills and competencies they take with them will be as important as the knowledge. Knowledge is easy to teach and, if not taught, it can be easy to find with the help of information technology. Conversely, skills and competencies need to be scaffolded, practised, and refined. We are beginning a journey to disrupt how we 'do' education at Kavanagh and we aim to make the learning of skills and competencies such as perseverance, resilience, critical thinking and collaboration, as important at the acquisition of knowledge.

Our mission statement that Kavanagh College exists to promote excellence in learning and teaching in a climate of faith and pastoral care, needs little explanation and I am proud of the holistic education that is valued by our students and their families. We also value our special place in the tapestry of Dunedin education, where social justice, living as Jesus would, and valuing differences in one another is held as highly as sporting, cultural and academic success. Congratulations, Georgie Watts!




Ms Watts received her Masters in Education and Learning with Distinction.

He Whetū Tirama performance

Last year Piata Rapata-Hanning wrote about why Māori women miss out with the Hongi for an NCEA internal and it was published in the Otago Daily Times in November of the same year.

Anzac Buglers

Traditionally the buglers play the Last Post which is followed by two minutes silence, they then play The Rouse.

The Last Post is used historically to mark the end of the soldiers day and The Rouse was traditionally played in the morning to wake the soldiers up.
