Tēnā koutou katoa

One of the reasons I love my job is being surrounded by the energy of young people. That energy has been put to good use during a busy term of cultural, arts, and sporting experiences. The term began with the Matariki Night Market and Showcase, encompassing kapa haka performances, entrepreneurship, poetry, dance, and music. The success of this cross-curricular event was profiled in the "New Zealand Education Gazette" which was a fitting acknowledgement for those involved with the inception, planning, and execution of this event – well done team!

Awards were aplenty as the term went on. One of our Year 7&8 Classics teams won the University of Otago Classics Quiz (intermediate section), putting our name on the cup for the first time. I am not sure who was more excited by this - the teachers who prepared them or the students themselves! One of our junior hip hop teams that qualified for Nationals was rewarded with medals, Oliver Lodge continued to be recognised as one of New Zealand's best young songwriters, and our Chamber Music Group won at the Dunedin Performing Arts Society Competitions. In a similar way, junior sports held their own, with our Year 7 basketball team winning the Dunedin competition and a clean sweep of five out of five wins at the intermediate netball finals day with three teams winning their grades. It was an exciting winter tournament week for our junior boys' basketball team who came 3rd in the A grade Junior Zone 4 Basketball - a great result for our first-time entry into this tournament. Our girls' first XI football team gained a silver medal in the Lotto Sportswear Girls' Football Tournament in Timaru, which was our best result in ten years. Of course, these successes and opportunities can't happen without the support and commitment of the students, parents, staff, and coaches – thank you!

This year's Social Justice Week theme was "Imagine Peace for All" and it was valuable to have Farid Ahmed, MNZM, visit us to speak with our senior students. Farid lost his wife in the 2019 mosque shootings and his message about

unity through diversity was an important one for our seniors to hear as they move out into the world to be the change makers of the next generation. Thank you to the Edmund Rice Network that provided the opportunity for Farid's visit.

We now move into the 'pointy end' of the academic year with practice exams completed and NCEA external exams just around the corner. Prizegivings and awards evenings will be upon us shortly and we have taken the opportunity to review some of these. As a result, this year we will hold our inaugural Sports and Cultural Blues Evening. The Sports Awards and Cultural Awards will also continue as usual because these are unique events with arts and sports prefect involvement, and they are an opportunity to acknowledge students who have committed and given their best throughout the year.

I have no doubt that Term 4 will be as successful as Term 3 but, firstly, our young people have a couple of weeks for some down-time. As spring unfolds and the world awakens to new life, encourage them to take the opportunity to reflect on the beauty of creation and the spiritual significance of this season. Farid Ahmed - A Message Of Peace and Forgiveness

Early in September, Farid Ahmed (MNZM) visited Trinity Catholic College and spoke to the Year 12 and 13 students.

Farid was forced to leave his home country of Bangladesh as a 26 year old and has lived in New Zealand since 1988. Ten years later he was paralysed in an accident when he was struck by a speeding drunk driver while walking to work. Farid is also a survivor of the Al Noor Mosque Shooting in Christchurch in March 2019. During this attack, Farid lost many brothers and sisters of his faith community, but most tragically for Farid, he also lost his wife, Husna.

Farid spoke to the Trinity students about his experience of forgiveness and compassion and also his strong commitment to spend the rest of his life advocating for peace, unity,



kindness, and friendship. Farid's talk was extremely relevant as it came during Caritas Aotearoa New Zealand's Social Justice Week with the theme "Imagine Peace for All / Pohewatia te Rangimārie mō te Katoa".

It was an absolute honour to hear Farid share his message of love, hope, and forgiveness. He challenged us all to see every person we encounter as a brother and sister of God, one human family.

Year 12 Geography Trip to Aoraki Mt Cook

Early in Term 3, the Year 12 Geography class was fortunate to have three perfect days at Glentanner and Aoraki Mt Cook National Park to study glaciation and human impacts on the South Island High Country.

The group enjoyed the Hooker Valley Walk and the two swing bridges, before a session on glaciation by a DOC ranger. Dinner was followed by a visit from a Glentanner Station farmer who values farming as a way forward for the MacKenzie Country, but has concerns about wilding pines.

The next morning the students were up bright and early to board the chopper. It was an exhilarating, once in a lifetime experience which allowed the group to view glaciers, braided rivers and, of course, Aoraki Mt Cook.

Following the flight the students went data hunting and collecting on the Red Tarns track, returning with all the info they needed for the upcoming internal assessment. Finally, the group headed out to see the Tasman Glacier. By this time the class was becoming fluent in using geographic terminologies like moraine, scree, and accumulation zones.

The class acquitted themselves very well throughout the trip which included lots of new and wonderful experiences for the students, as well as interesting and important learning.

Evaluating the balance between risk and reward, students seized the chance to push their boundaries on the slopes with many mastering the ability to control their speed and keep their balance. The fresh snow proved fortunate, offering a soft landing for those moments when things didn't unfold precisely as intended.

The final morning was absolutely stunning with a third day of blue skies and sunshine. We packed up and skied from Musterers Hut back to the base before heading home.

Well done to the students who persevered, adopted a positive attitude, and encouraged each other and themselves to make the most of this experience.

Bishop's Shield 2023

Twenty Trinity Catholic College students and seven staff spent the first weekend of August in Gore at the 79th Bishop's Shield Competition.

The Bishop's Shield is an annual competition where students from the four Catholic high schools in the Dunedin Diocese (Verdon College, St Peter's College, St Kevin's College, and Trinity Catholic College) compete against one another in prepared speech, impromptu speech, junior and senior debating, junior and senior drama, and junior and senior scripture.

This is a significant event not only in terms of the competition, but also because it brings together the four Catholic colleges in the diocese and provides a wonderful opportunity for students to make friends and reconnect with those they've met at previous Bishop's Shield weekends. Indeed, the sense of

community and camaraderie evident during the Bishop's Shield event is very special for all those involved.

Well done to all the students who took part this year and special congratulations to Jeremy Meikle who won the Prepared Speech and to Ethan Then, Akein Wickramagedara, and Ché McGivern who won the Junior Debate.

Performing Arts

Term 3 has been a very busy one for those involved with the performing arts at Trinity. There's been hip hop competitions, musical events, a drama festival, and a number of song-writing successes.

TheatreFest

This year, for the first time, Trinity entered the Otago regional round of the drama festival TheatreFest which took place in July. A group of ten senior students performed a 30-minute New Zealand play called "The Careers Room" written by Philippa Werry. The Trinity group did a wonderful job bringing their play to life and provided the audience with an entertaining piece of theatre - and also achieved an award for Excellence in Ensemble Playing.

Hip Hop

At the beginning of August, four Trinity Hip Hop Crews competed in the Otago/Southland Hip Hop Competition. There were two crews in the primary/intermediate section (Titanium and Collision) and two in the secondary school section (Syndicate and Legacy). All the crews were superbly coached by four senior Trinity students - Jemma Mortimer, April Gamao, Phoebe Harris, and Tia Mawhinney.

The crews performed wonderfully at the regionals with Titanium coming 1st in the primary/intermediate section and Collision 3rd, while Syndicate took 3rd place in the secondary section. As a result, these three crews qualified for the National Hip Hop Competition a month later. Once again these crews did Trinity proud - Syndicate made it to the finals against some very tough competition, while Titanium gained 3rd place in their section.

Jazz Festival

This term the Trinity Jazz Band and a Small Combo took part in the annual Dunedin Youth Jazz Festival held this year at Hanover Hall. The musicians played very well and several of them were highlighted as excellent jazz soloists!

BandQuest

This year Trinity Catholic College was represented at BandQuest (a live band competition for musicians in Year 8 and below) by a group called *Wallflowerz* which was made up of Camila Barns, Isla Harris, and Jemma Hapeta. They did an awesome job and really enjoyed the experience of performing to a large and appreciative audience.

Song Writing

Trinity student Oliver Lodge (Year 12) has had multiple successes this term with his song writing. He was a finalist in the 2023 Play It Strange Peace Songwriting Competition for his song "Te Ao Marama" which earned him the opportunity to have his song recorded in a professional recording studio to go on the 2023 Peace Song digital album.

He also entered the University of Waikato Composition Competition and was one of three secondary school









students selected to have his composition ("Darkness, Grief and Unspeakable Sorrow") workshopped and performed.

And, just recently it was announced that Oliver, together with fellow Trinity musicians Anamika Jones, Jamie Hall, and Jayden Deuster-Parker, had won the senior section of the 2023 Caritas SINGout4JUSTICE competition.

Class Act 2023

Both Samuel and April have achieved academic excellence during their time at Trinity. In addition to this, April is a highly skilled hip hop dancer, the environmental prefect, and hopes to make the world a better place for others, while Samuel is a very talented



performer (actor, singer, dancer) having appeared already on stage in numerous musicals and plays, as well as being an adept football player.

The students received their award (which includes a University of Otago scholarship) from the Prime Minister.

Science Fair

Saira Eldho (Year 10) won three prizes at this year's Otago Science Fair for her project entitled "Green Hydrogen", which she completed entirely out of the classroom.

Saira was awarded the NZ Institute of Chemistry Award, the Aurora Energy Award, and the Keith Dawber Memorial Award for Alternative and Renewable Energy.

The goal of Saira's project was to see if there is any pH difference in water sources and if she could produce hydrogen gas from these water sources to use as a renewable source of energy ("green" hydrogen). She used electrolysis to carry out this experiment to produce hydrogen from different water sources - sea water, distilled water, tap water, lake water, and river water.



Classics Quiz

Tuesday evening, 15 August, saw teams of Classical Studies scholars come together in a quiz hosted by the Classics Department at the University of Otago.

Trinity Catholic College entered three teams this year into the intermediate and junior competitions. The Year 9 team (made up of Heath Kettish, Keziah Porthouse, Harrison Rich, and Luke Wild) was named Dionysus' Dolphins, while the two Year 7/8 teams were Apollo's Arrows (Julian Osland, Will Paterson, and Mina Suwanarusk) and The Olympians (Thomas Walker, Austin Gillespie, and Kaila Rioveros).

The teams had to answer questions about Greek and Roman mythology, history, the Otago Museum collection, the Greek alphabet, art, and important historical figures.



At the end of the evening, The Olympians were tied for third place in their section and Apollo's Arrows won the competition, taking the first place trophy for the intermediate section back to Trinity Catholic College.
